



**COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES AWARDED MILLIONS IN
HOUSING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT FUNDING FROM
THE AMERICAN RECOVERY AND REINVESTMENT ACT**

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA), better known as the second economic stimulus bill, was signed into law by President Barack Obama on February 17th, 2009. ARRA made over \$16 billion dollars available to public housing organizations such as the Community Development Commission of the County of Los Angeles (CDC) and the Housing Authority of the County of Los Angeles (HACoLA), by increasing funding for existing programs as well as making funding available for newer services.

Through ARRA, the CDC and the HACoLA were awarded over \$33.6 million in funding for several programs addressing community development, homelessness prevention, and upgrades to our multifamily housing properties. In this, the County of Los Angeles (County) was awarded over \$12.1 million for the [Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-housing Program](#) to implement homelessness prevention initiatives, and \$8 million for the [Community Development Block Grant Program](#) to provide affordable housing services and jobs for the most vulnerable residents of the County. Approximately \$13.3 million was also granted to the HACoLA's [Public Housing Capital Fund](#) for security improvements, energy efficiency work measures, preventive maintenance, and general improvements to 12 of our public housing developments; of which, over \$5.9 million was awarded competitively to fund energy efficient/green community projects.
